

Remembering our Heroes like Sgt. Joseph Lilly



This Memorial Day, we turn our attention to the many heroes who gave the ultimate sacrifice – their lives – in support of American freedoms. Flint native Sgt. Joseph Lilly is a wonderful representation of American heroism and spirit.

Sgt. Lilly was a combat engineer who died two days after being wounded by an insurgent in Afghanistan. He is buried at Great Lakes National Cemetery in Holly and is memorialized with a tablet in the American Veterans' Memorial Section at Resurrection.

Sgt. Lilly believed so strongly in the Army's mission that he volunteered to serve his last tour in Afghanistan. He loved being a U.S. Army soldier and representing all Americans wherever he went around the world.

Two weeks before his death, Sgt. Lilly was hit by a sniper's bullet through his chin and was medevacked to Kanda-

har. His stitches were removed and he was cleared to return to his unit, but not released for combat duty.

When Sgt. Lilly returned to his unit, his military leaders on the ground were looking for volunteers to go on a mission.

With the love of his brothers in mind, Sgt. Lilly vol-

unteered. An hour into the mission, an IED exploded and Sgt. Lilly, seriously wounded, was medevacked back to the medical unit in Kandahar.

As the medical staff began treating him, LTCDR Kathryn Wilgus noticed a problem. The nametag on Sgt. Lilly's uniform wasn't his. She had just spent over two weeks caring for his prior injury and knew what he looked like.

They soon found out that although Sgt. Lilly had been cleared to return to his unit, he hadn't been cleared to resume his combat duty. When they asked for volunteers, this true hero put another soldier's jacket on because he was determined to be with his brothers-in-arms at all costs.

Michael Lilly, Joe's dad, said he was proud of his son's choice to fight for his country and that we can all learn from his actions and his dedication. "Joe knew what the consequence was," Michael says. "It was worth it to him because he believed in what he was doing. He was trying to keep us free and out of the clutches of terrorism. He accepted the risk. That right there is someone who has a lot of guts."

This Memorial Day we remember and honor our heroes like Sgt. Joseph Lilly.

The mission of America's Gold Star Families is to provide honor, hope and healing to those grieving any military loss through active-duty service in the United States Armed Forces. Every branch of the U.S. Military is represented and all conflicts are recognized. Gold Star Families Memorial Monuments are a two-sided tribute made of black granite that depict images and words of valor and heroism

One side bares the words: Gold Star Families Memorial Monument, a tribute to Gold Star Families and Relatives who sacrificed a Loved One for our Freedom.

A stunning glass mosaic feature will soon adorn our Orthodox Garden

Our Orthodox Section that opened in August 2019 will soon include a prominent feature that has been chosen with the help of local Orthodox community leaders.

Designed by Gianfranco Tassara of Inspired Artisans Ltd. in Milwaukee, this 4-sided feature includes many iconographic representations of the following four themes:

- Crucifixion
- Resurrection
- Ascension
- Mother of God

This 16-foot tall feature is made of Gray granite and Color Venetian Glass Mosaic. It will be installed in the center of the Orthodox Section at Resurrection and will be visible from all four sides, and from any location in the entire section.


We will be planning a formal Dedication event for families, community leaders and others once the feature has been installed, with more information available in the months ahead. Here's further information about what the feature represents.

Crucifixion

In Christ's crucifixion, we come to fully understand what God is really about. All speculations about Him break down and all we are left with is the image of God who loved the world so much, that He sent His only Son into the world who emptied Himself of his divinity, taking on the form of a servant, becoming a man; a man who was willing to be crucified and tortured at the hands of his own creation so that he can make those same hands a part of Himself, and by extension, a part of his Father.

Resurrection

Christ's glorious Resurrection from the dead is the central tenant of the Orthodox faith. We believe that through His resurrection life is granted to all the world and we shall participate in this new life both here and in the world to come. We joyfully proclaim that death no longer has power over mankind, for life has dawned from the tomb.



Ascension

Forty days after His Resurrection, Jesus ascended into heaven in the presence of all His Disciples. Those of Orthodox Faith believe that the same way that Jesus ascended, He will one day return to us. We also remember that after this day for the first time in history a human being sits on the throne of God, equal with God the Father.

Panagia (Virgin Mary)

The person of the Panagia is especially revered in the Orthodox Church. She guides us, prays for us, heals us, and gives us a model of obedience to God, purity, meekness, and love. We believe that her Son listens to her prayers and advice, just as He did at the wedding of Cana, and so we turn to her with faith and hope during our times of trouble and ask for her protection.

Why are coins left on cemetery headstones?

Modern tradition holds that leaving coins on military tombstones denotes visits from living soldiers.

While visiting some cemeteries you may notice that headstones marking certain graves have coins on them, left by previous visitors to the grave. These coins have distinct meanings when left on the headstones of those who gave their life while serving in America's military. Their meanings vary depending on the denomination of the coin.

A coin left on a headstone or at the grave site is meant as a message to the deceased soldier's family that someone else has visited the grave to pay respect. Leaving a penny at the grave means simply that you visited.

A nickel indicates that you and the deceased trained at boot camp together, while a dime means you served with him in some capacity. By leaving a quarter at the grave, you are telling the family that you were with the soldier when he



was killed.

According to tradition, the money left at graves in national cemeteries and state veterans cemeteries is eventually collected, and the funds are put toward maintaining the cemetery or paying burial costs for indigent veterans.

Please contact the Resurrection office with questions.

- Only fresh or dried flowers in approved coned containers are permitted on graves. Artificial flowers are not permitted.
- Planting annuals or perennials is allowed in the area above the headstone.
- Flower boxes are not required but are allowed. They must be 24" x 12" and flush with the ground and placed above the headstone.
- To conserve water please limit your watering to 20 minutes or less.
- To maintain the beauty of the cemetery regular clean ups are performed by our grounds professionals. All artificial flowers and non-conforming decorations on ground burial sections are removed and discarded.
- While visiting please keep your vehicle off the grass.
- U.S. flags are available in the office to be placed on graves of Veterans buried at Resurrection.
